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We Will Remember Cliff Ball

As all of our members are now sadly aware. Cliff Ball, our National Secretary, died at his desk, on Friday, June 2, 1972. Cliff had served us in his current assignment since the inception of the OX5 Club in 1955. Obviously, Cliff's sudden passing was a terrific shock and loss to all aviation pioneers. His love and devotion to this Club was unmatched. In its earlier

days of growing pains, Cliff was practically the "glue" that held it together. Today, OX5 is the largest pioneer pilot organization in the world.

Cliff was a native Pittsburgher -one of eleven children of an English-born coal miner. After graduating from McKeesport High School, he became a clerk at the Federal National Bank; took night courses in finance and economics at Duquesne University, and a business course at Duff's Iron City College. During WW I, he served with American forces in France, fighting through Chateau Thiery and the Argonne for 101 days of combat.

Returning from overseas, Cliff Ball started an automobile business which showed great signs of success. Then, one Sunday afternoon he drove past a field near Dravosburg where he stopped to watch Eddie Stinson and his Zephyr Fliers. And for \$15.00 he bought a "straight up and straight down" ride in an OX5 Jenny. That same day Eddie and Cliff, both exservicemen, became better acquainted. They talked about aviation and what it soon would mean to the world. Cliff went back again to talk with Eddie, and to aviation was born a new and enthusiastic supporter. Eddie moved on with his barnstormers. Cliff commenced talking flying to anyone who would listen. But there were few listeners. One of them recently told Cliff - "You know, fella, in those days I thought you were completely nuts."

Cliff talked of airports, landing strips, or anything from which aircraft could operate. "Build the nests and the birds will come" was one of his slogans. He believed in it. And in 1924, he had become so enamored with the prospective future of aviation that he mortgaged everything he owned, and borrowed all he could, to raise \$35,000 to purchase 40 acres above Dravosburg on which to build an airport. This spot later became Bettis Field, named for Cyrus Bettis, a

World War I flying Ace.

To recoup as much as he could, and as quickly as possible, Cliff ran airshows at his new airport. But, realizing that pilots would need steadier jobs, he worked with his friend, Congressman M. Clyde Kelly, for passage of the first national air law, later known as the Kelly Air Mail Act.

Soon thereafter, Cliff established the first airmail service in Pennsylvania. And on April 26, 1927, using four Waco 9's, his newly formed airline began carrying the mail from Pittsburgh to Cleveland. A year later, using the same aircraft, the Clifford Ball Airlines began carrying passeng-

ers over the same route - one flight a day in each direction. It was not unusual to see a lone passenger sitting on mail sacks while flying the route, known as "The Path of the Eagle." This service was soon extended to Washington, D.C.

Later, the Clifford Ball Airlines became Pennsylvania Airlines. Then, as mounting pressures forced him to sell his air mail contract, the firm under its new owners became Penn Central; then Capitol Airlines, which merged into United Airlines in 1961. then went to work with Pittsburgh Aviation Industries as a V.P., after which he tried a spell of retirement in Florida. But with his heart and mind still in his former locale, he returned to Pittsburgh to become the first Superintendent of Greater Pittsburgh Airport. which opened in 1952. And he served as Director of Allegheny County Airport. He also served as the

Remaining in PIT, and at the office, from early morning until late every night for the next four days, I found what I guess I already knew, which included the exceptional knowledge and control Miss Balmer has in all of the office routine. Actually, all that I could add, was the psychological and administrative touch to complete the circuit. And it was indeed gratifying and pleasing to me, to be able to return home, knowing that concise arrangements had been effected with Miss Balmer to provide for her continuing with the office routine. while I take over the administrative duties at this end. This is of course a tentative arrangement. But I know it will work as we want it to, and as Cliff Ball would have wanted it to, until a new National Secretary can be named in September, at Columbus. I personally believe that all will go well during this current arrangement.

From the personal discussions and correspondence I have had with Foster Lane, our Reunion Chairman, it is most evident that we will have three full daysand nights-of enjoyable activity in one of the finest hotels. Incidentally, the Neil House has a terrific reputation and among other attributes, it has recently been completely refurbished. I use the term "glumly" because I have enjoyed being your President for the past two years, and according to the By-Laws, two years is the max limit covering the term of the President. I'll still be "on tap" until 1 January, 1973, and at that time, whomever it will be that takes my place, will be most fortunate to take over one of the greatest outfits he can ever find. Thank you all for your fine support, and for all you have done for me and for OX5ers.

CANDIDATES SELECTED FOR 1972 ELECTION

John I. Schnaubelt, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, assisted by committee members R. V. Trader and W. T. Homan, certified the list of candidates whose names will appear on the 1972 ballot.

The National Board of Governors consists of fifteen members. Five governors are to be elected from this list - ten governors are holdovers representing the

various wings.

Nominations were carefully screened as they came in from Wing Presidents, Wing Secretaries, and individual members. The nominee's background was reviewed as to current membership, experience in OX5 affairs, experience as wing officers, attendance at wing meetings, and attendance at the national reunions.

The Club's by-laws restricts the election of one Na-

tional Board member from any one state.

A charter member of the OX5 Club. Served 6 years as President of the Florida Wing. Chairman of several national committees. Completing 6 years on the National Board. Two terms as National President. Chairman of the Hall of Fame Committee.

GLENN MESSER (No. 7071), Birmingham, Ala.†

An Early Bird – was their National President. Served as Chairman of several national committees; active in local Wing affairs, presently President of the Alabama Wing.

ANTHONY BITETTI (No. 1464), Gardena, Calif.

Served on various national committees. Frequent visitor to Wing meetings outside Southern Calif. Reorganized and served as President of the Southern

California Wing. Winner of the President's award in 1971.

OLIVER PHILLIPS (No. 8565), Wheat Ridge, Colo.

Completing his first term on the National Board. Active in national affairs. Serving as Chairman of the Hall of Fame Screening Committee.

DICK PALEN (No. 3909), Edina, Minn.

Active in Minnesota Wing affairs. Served as Wing President. Frequent attender at National Reunions, representing the Wing at the General Assembly.

WYATT, Owen (No. 7237), Birmingham, Ala.†

Served the Alabama Wing as President, and presently as Wing Secretary. Served as chairman of the Reunion Committee Alabama Wing. Attended several National Reunions.

BYRON W. HOOK (No. 728), Oklahoma City, Okla.

One of the early members of the Club. Served as Secretary of the D.C. Wing in the early days. Now serving as President of the Oklahoma Wing.

ROY VENCILL (No. 2448), Dallas, Texas

Active in local affairs. Served on National Committees in the past. Completing his first term as a National Governor.


ALABAMA WING By Owen Wyatt



President of the Aero Club of Pittsburgh for more than 30 years. It was through the cooperation and assistance of the Aero Club of Pittsburgh that the OX5 Club was founded.

During WW II, Cliff was Managing Director for Graham Aviation Company of Butler, Clarion, Oil City and Meadville Airports, where 1,400 instructors for military aviation and 7,000 pilots for the Army were trained.

No task was too large nor too small for Cliff, especially if it concerned aviation. His writings, best known as Editor of the OX5 NEWS, were patterned in the style of his old friend Ernie Pyle who formerly sat around the airport writing stories about pilots.

Cliff Ball was honored with distinction on many occasions. In 1965, upon the dedication of the Pittsburgh Institute of Aeronautics' new \$80,000 head-quarters, it became known as the Clifford Ball Academic Building, and Cliff as the "Grand Old Man of Aviation." Cliff's name is in the OX5 Aviation Hall of Fame, which he helped develop and which he cherished.

The numerous phone calls and messages of sympathy received as the news of his death spread across the Nation, are a tribute to the high esteem in which he was held. The wire services carried stories in many of the leading newspapers everywhere.

In memoriam, we can only say there never was a better liked "guy" in aviation than Cliff Ball. He was one of the Nation's most outstanding aviation personalities. His almost continuous smile and his expressions of interest and confidence, will never be forgotten by those of us who knew him well. As one of our members has said: "A giant has been lost."

A fond farewell to our old friend as he wings his way to the West.
