# Do I need a Certified Aircraft Appraisal?

Used for a variety of reasons, certified aircraft appraisals are much like flight plans; they provide financial guidance to get you from point A to point B. Certified is defined as "to attest as being true or meeting a standard".

The IRS requires a certified aircraft appraisal that meets the Uniform Standards of Professional Appraisal Practice (USPAP) for tax credits on personal property worth more than \$5,000. and estate tax when your estate is valued in excess of one million dollars.

Parties in need of aircraft valuation services should ensure they are engaging individuals with proper certification to carry out the assignment. Certified aircraft appraisals must be credible, the appraiser must be independent to all parties involved, impartial, have no financial interest in the asset and be objective without prejudice.

# Folded Wings

**Donald Sabol** passed away at the age of 93. He was an active civilian and military aviator for 40 years which he started at the age of 16 when he soloed in a Curtis Robin powered by an OX5 engine. His son, Bruce Sabol tells us that Donald valued the OX5 organization greatly.

**Donald Nordlund** passed away at the age of 86.

**John Hornbaker** died at the age of 97. The first time he saw a barnstormer at the age of 12, he knew he wanted to be a pilot. He became a mechanic and pilot of Curtiss airplanes with OX5 engines. He served in WWII and went on to fly for United Airlines 1947 – 1977.

Raul A. Wulf, long-time member of the Florida Wing, died on March 13, 2014. Raul came to America in 1952 from Chile. He enlisted in the U.S. Army and after returning home from 3 years in Germany, worked for Pan Am. He also worked for several other airlines.

**R. Brian Grigsby** was a restoration shop volunteer who put in more than 20 years helping to restore, reproduce, and fly antique seaplanes at the Glenn H. Curtiss Museum. Brain started his engineering career as a captain in the USAF piloting B-25s, C-119's, and C-123's. He went on to work for General Dynamics Astronautics as a systems engineer and then was part of the team at Vanderburg AFB that had the 1<sup>st</sup> successful launch of an underground missile. At the Kennedy Space Center he participated in 125 launches of the Delta rocket. He was the Manager of External Tank/Solid Rocket

Booster Mechanical Systems for the first Space Shuttle launches. He was then appointed to the Space Station Task Force in Washington, D.C. and went on to become the project engineer in the Space Station Project Office.

Evelyn Latorre was asked to join OX5 Aviation Pioneers with her husband Joe by Bob Cavaness in 1972. She immediately got involved and "did whatever needed to be done". She once said that when she was cleaning the OX5 building at the Sun 'n Fun airport, that she "wondered what the heck she was doing here". But then she stated what kept her coming back "are all the nice people – they immediately start saying Hi and she has a good time with them". During this last reunion a sign given by the Meek brothers which was put above the kitchen in the OX5 Building stating it is "Evelyn's Kitchen".

#### **Kansas Wing**

Lunch at NEWELL'S at Newton was a great time for conversation before the trip on over to the airport and the viewing of the Lockheed 10A . Leeb VonFange, Wichita Air Service shop manager, showed us around the airplane. The company is doing a great restoration of the airplane. They have restored several significant airplanes, including a Grumman Duck.

The Lockheed 10A is a model similar to Amelia Earhart's Lockheed 10E. The restoration was nearly complete when we were there. It will be ferried to Prague in the Czech Republic next May, when the weather is better. The Bata Shoe Co. purchased the airplane in 1937 and used it in the business. Shortly after buying the airplane it was flown around the world promoting Bata shoes. It was found in Texas, and the Bata family decided to restore it. With present day technology, materials, etc. the aircraft is better than new.

The First of the Great Flying Boats

In 1914, Rodman Wanamaker contacted Glenn Curtiss to build an aircraft that was capable of flying across the Atlantic Ocean. The result of that challenge was the Curtiss America. Shown above is the Curtiss Museum reproduction of this original flying boat. Completed in 2007, it was presented to the public in September 2007 and flew successfully in 2008 and 2009. It is now retired and on display in the Glenn H. Curtiss Museum in Hammondsport, NY.
